Jim,

The test is whether or not the data would have value in the hands of a competitor. For instance, if an architect provides us with plans, those could be copied by a competitor and have value in their hands. But, that's an easy example - it's generally a tough test. Generally, all data we receive is presumptively public. There are significant penalties for violating the law. There needs to be an articulated protection for it in the act. Ask Foth to articulate the basis for their claim that the data is confidential and to describe what that data consists of – specifically. We do have a data requestor who is very active on this case.

BTW – Ann Kaul is the Data Practices expert in legal. Please work with her.
